

Exhibitor Rules and Regulations

All entries must be done online at <http://sherb.fairmanager.com>.

1. **NEW!!!!!!!!!!!!!! A .25¢ fee will be charge for each entry that is registered but not brought in to be judged after the first 5 that do not come in. So entry # 6 will be charged \$.25, and each additional one after that will be.25¢. With floriculture and horticultural, exceptions will be made IF the weather has had an effect on the product.**
2. Articles must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner and all crops must have been raised and articles exhibited must have been made by the exhibitor.
3. Exhibitors will forfeit their premiums and ribbons if they do not adhere to this rule.
4. Exhibitors will be allowed to make only one entry in each class in their age group **unless** otherwise indicated.
5. No articles will be allowed to compete for premiums that are not named on the premium list. One item may be entered in the "other" category but it cannot be exhibited in the "other" class if it has a class listed.
6. The Agricultural Society will endeavor to arrange space for all qualified exhibits.
7. No professionals will be allowed to enter. Professionals will be interpreted as anyone who sells for money their product or what would be entered for a substantial portion of their income, with the exception of agricultural products and livestock. Only amateur gardeners may exhibit vegetables and flowers in competition. Commercial growers should contact the Fair Board for display arrangements.
8. Exhibits should be brought to the open class building on the Fair Grounds between 9 AM and 6 PM on Tuesday the week of the fair. All entries must be in place by 6 PM.
9. The open class building is open during the week of the fair on Thursday, Friday and Saturday from 9 AM to 9 PM, and on Sunday from 9 AM to 7 PM.
10. Open class exhibits must be picked up on the first Monday after the fair from 1 PM to 6 PM. Anyone removing their exhibits before Monday will forfeit their premiums.
11. Every precaution will be taken to preserve and protect an exhibit, but the Agricultural Society and the Fair Board cannot and will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur in the delivery, exhibition or removal of exhibits.
12. If weather or other conditions, outside of the control of the Board, prohibits the payment of all expenses, the board reserves the right to pay first all true expenses of the fair and pay premiums with the balance on hand.
13. Any interference by exhibitors to influence or dictate the decision of the judges will be sufficient cause for excluding his or her entry from competition and should be reported to the open class superintendent.
14. No appeal of a decision shall be allowed. An exhibitor may protest to the superintendent of the open class who may then require the judges to give reasons for their decision.
15. The premiums will be awarded on articles or animals based on merit. The judges are not required to give a placing if the article does not meet the requirements of the class. Whenever possible, judges will note on the entry tag their comments.
16. Parking of all vehicles for exhibitors during the fair will be in the main parking areas/lots. Drop off Tuesday and pickup Monday, you can enter the grounds by the West gate. There are gate charges on the four days of the fair only.
17. All checks must be cashed within 60 days.
18. No advertising is allowed on the grounds without written permission of the fair board. NO posting of any kind will be allowed.
19. No dogs will be allowed to enter onto the Sherburne County Fair Grounds at any time, with the exception of working service dogs, or dogs for exhibits/demonstrations. These dogs will be kept on a lease at all times. Any dog found on the grounds may be impounded.
20. The management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as they, in their judgement, may deem necessary.
21. The Sherburne County Agricultural Society reserves absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or in connections with, or incident to the fair.
22. Errors of omissions due to printing errors will be corrected at the superintendent's discretion.
23. **The Ag Society will not assume any responsibility for disease, sickness, injury, loss or damage contracted during the Fair. This includes, but not limited to: livestock, animals, projects, exhibits and exhibitors.**
24. Premiums paid are: 1st place \$3, 2nd place \$2 and 3rd place \$1.

DEPARTMENT "C" – FLORICULTURE

RULES OF ENTRY:

1. Entrants must bring their own containers, suitable for the flowers exhibited
2. Entries in tin cans will not be judged
3. An exhibitor can exhibit one item per class, and must exhibit in their age group.
4. An article will not be accepted in 'other' if there is a lot for the item.
5. Entries with incorrect number of blooms or stems will not be judged.
